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President Obama will deliver a televised back-to-school speech Tuesday.

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When kids across the country return to school Tuesday, some will see a televised, back-to-school speech from President Barack Obama, and some will not.

While state education officials say it's up to local school districts whether students hear Obama talk about the need to work hard and stay in school, area school districts are taking both sides, or in some cases, putting the decision in teachers' hands.

Peoria District 150 Superintendent Ken Hinton said Friday they are making the speech available for students.

"The president is speaking about the importance of education . . . it has nothing to do with the president's party affiliation, it is about our children knowing and realizing the great importance of acquiring a good education," Hinton said.

Elmwood Superintendent Roger Alvey says they've issued no mandate either way.

"Apparently, there's some national hysteria over this, though we've only gotten two calls," Alvey said. "We told the teachers if they have time to show it, fine, if not, don't worry about it. From what I've seen (the speech) is about goal setting, the importance of education and persistence . . . the day we start censoring the president is the day I really start to worry. (But) if parents do not want their child



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to watch, just let us know."

Canton Union School District 66 Superintendent Roy Webb said high school students also will be given the option of watching the speech.

But calls by concerned parents have led many other schools not to tune in Obama's speech, to be delivered at 11 a.m. Tuesday.

IVC District 321 Superintendent Nick Polyak posted a letter to parents on the school's Web site why they are not.

"The timing of the address is during our lunch hours and we have received numerous phone calls from parents on both sides of this issue," Polyak said. "We have decided to leave this in the hands of our parents as to whether or not they would like to view the presidential address and have a discussion with their children."

East Peoria Community High School Superintendent Cliff Cobert said they were taking a similar stance.

"Some parents have called to inform us that they did not want the speech shown during class time. Parents can view the speech on the Internet, and we are encouraging parents to decide for themselves whether or not to view the speech," Cobert said.

Dunlap is delaying showing the speech until Wednesday to give parents a chance to view and then give them the option of allowing their children to watch or not, said Superintendent Jay Marino.

He said he heard from parents, some who voiced fear of potential political propaganda, or the president being "out of line" by requesting schools tune in, to those favoring its viewing. Marino said they still will treat the speech much like any other presidential address or "other historic event" on Wednesday.

Other school officials cited parental disapproval stemming from the president's belief system not aligning with their

At least one Peoria-area principal, who asked not to be named, said controversy about the speech, whether fair or not, has thrust her school and others into politics, with parents standing strongly on both sides. "It's a no-win situation," she said.

Transcripts of the speech are expected to be released by the White House on Monday and be available to read on the Internet.

Morton Superintendent Roger Kilpatrick asked teachers to review the text, adding it would be left up to teachers to decide. He also noted "any 'assignments' or 'classroom activities' suggested by the president or the Department of Education as part of this presentation are not part of our curriculum and need to conform to our curriculum."

On the U.S. Department of Education's Web site is a list of activities students can partake before, during and after the speech, some which pose specific questions including "What is the president trying to tell me?" and "What is the president asking me to do?"

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"It is our impression that the president will voice his support for all students," said Farmington Superintendent Mark Doan, where students can view the address unless parents object and request their student not watch.

"We will respect their wishes," Doan said.

While Metamora Township High School Superintendent Ken Maurer said they were not considering viewing it, he noted: "I hate to see it degrade into this (controversy). That can be a pretty powerful message - encouraging kids to come to school regularly, study hard and take responsibility in their own education."

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In an e-mail, Pekin 108 Superintendent Bill Link said they also were not viewing it because of "technical and practical challenges. (But) the staff may use the broadcast or portions of it at a later date to take advantage of the relevant 'teachable moments.'"

Hinton said the Peoria school district received numerous calls from families stating they will keep students at home if the district chooses to show the speech.

"Parents have every right to do that, but I think it's our responsibility to promote education and the well-being of our children," Hinton said. "I'm old-fashioned, I got to tell you, regardless when the president of the United States speaks, I don't look upon him being a Republican, a Democrat, he is the president - in the future she might be the president and we listen to the president and what the president has to say."

The district was discussing whether the absence would be treated as excused or not.
